

Temora was again well attended with 15 BSC gliders in attendance and an equal number from other clubs. The weather was kind with only one nonflying day during the two weeks. A number of 600, 500 & 300K's were completed by BSC members.

As many are aware, the IS28 was unserviceable for a period of 5 weeks early this year. This occurred because we couldn't obtain a suitable tube for the mainwheel. The Club maintains an inventory of important spares so that instances such as this are avoided. It is vitally important that when spares are used, the fact be communicated to Peter Newcomb, so that he can organise replacements.

The same procedure should be followed when there are instances of any of our equipment going u/s, or requiring maintenance. If you are uncertain whom to contact, tell me and I'll pass it onto the appropriate person.
